A One Pager Book Report is creative and unique, just like you are. Use color for pictures and text!

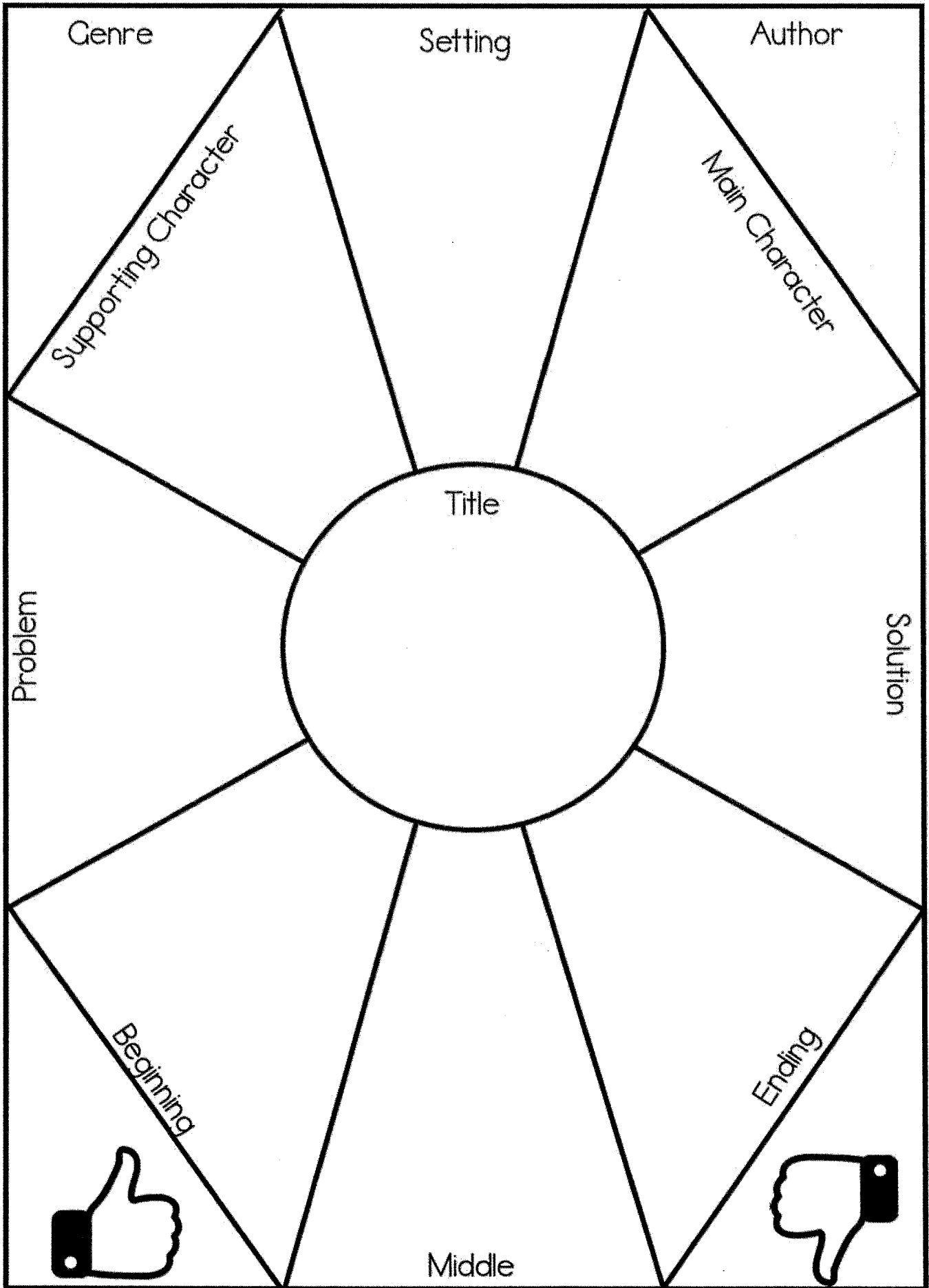
You may write in full sentences, paragraphs, bullet points, or use a powerful word to tell about your book. Use illustrations to show your understanding in a variety of ways.

## Directions

On your One Pager Book Report, use this guide to help you fill in the spaces.

- Title – The title of the novel – Kensuke's Kingdom
- Author – The author's name – Michael Morpurgo
- Setting – Describe and/or draw the setting. Time/Place
- Genre – Was the novel fiction or non-fiction. What type? Fiction = real  
Non-fiction = not real
- Main Character – Describe and/or draw the main character
- Supporting Character – Describe and/or draw the supporting character
- Problem – What was the problem in the novel?
- Solution – What was the solution? How did the character solve the problem?
- Beginning – What happened in the beginning of the novel?
- Middle – What happened in the middle of the novel?
- End – What happened at the end of the novel?
- Color the "thumbs up" if you liked the novel.
- Color the "thumbs down" if you did not like the novel?
