

Summer Reading 2023 Rising 8th Graders

It is said that reading is the key to learning, which is why most schools have summer reading programs. In fact, Reader's Digest states, "Studies have shown that a regular reading habit not only sharpens vocabulary and improves IQ but also reduces the brain's rate of decline in old age and expands 'EQ'—emotional intelligence and well-being."

Rising 8th graders will read the 1963 Newbery Medal winner A Wrinkle in Time. This is a fun and enjoyable book to read. While not considered an overtly Christian work, Madeline L'Engle incorporated many Christian themes and values into her story.

As you read, complete the question worksheets. These will help you comprehend and better understand what is taking place in a chapter. I will be giving a grade on the packet at the beginning of school. In addition, during the first two weeks our class will discuss the book and our first assignments will be linked to what you've learn from the book.

A word of caution: the book was made into a movie in 2018 by Disney, but be warned that the movie has taken many liberties and has altered the story significantly from the book. If you only watch the movie, it will be difficult to do well on the assignment.

Also, every student will take an Accelerated Reader (AR) on the story test to determine their comprehension level. This too will be a grade.
